The situation has been blamed on recent increases in course fees, plus the fact that more students from less advantaged homes are entering higher



education. This is the case for Timothy
Spiller, twenty-one, an accountancy
student at London Metropolitan
University. Timothy comes from a lowincome family and will need to borrow
the maximum amount available in order

to complete his degree. Despite the prospect of huge debts, Timothy remains confident he will graduate, find well-paid work and pay off his loans in full. It is, he says, a very strong motivator to work hard.
